he Antonio Pizzigati Prize for Software in the Public Interest annually grants a cash award for an outstanding contribution in public interest software development.

In 2008, the Pizzigati Prize will award \$10,000 to one individual who has created or led the effort to create software of significant value to the nonprofit sector.

We hope, with this prize, to recognize an individual who has developed open source software that:

- is available on a no-cost basis to nonprofits and advocacy groups.
- has demonstrated its value to at least one nonprofit organization.
- can serve multiple nonprofits.

The online application process, at www.pizzigatiprize.org, will open on June 1, 2008, with applications due by September 1.

#### **Our Prize Advisory Panel**

Three veteran national leaders in public interest computing — Allison Fine, Joseph Mouzon, and Katrin Verclas — will be selecting the 2008 Pizzigati Prize winner.

This year's Advisory Panel also includes George Hotelling, the winner of the first Pizzigati Prize in 2006, and last year's winner, Barry Warsaw, the developer of GNU Mailman, an open source application that's helping nonprofits worldwide manage email and e-newsletters.
